MOBILE PATROLS

Mobile security personnel who patrol an area in a vehicle or on foot.

DEFINITION

Patrol various sites, often covering large areas.

02



LOCATION

Constantly moving, patrolling different areas in a specific pattern.

03



MOVEMENT

High visibility due to constant movement and marked vehicles.

04



VISIBILITY

STATIC GUARDING

Stationary security personnel who monitor a specific area or location.

01

Stationed at a single site or location.

02

Stationary, with occasional movement to patrol the area.

03

Visible but less noticeable due to being stationary.

04

MOBILE PATROLS

More flexible, able to respond quickly to incidents across different locations.

05



High deterrent effect due to constant presence and visibility.

06



Provides a wider coverage area, but may have less focus on specific areas.

07



Generally more expensive due to the need for vehicles and more personnel.

08



Suitable for large areas, multiple sites or businesses with mobile assets.

09



STATIC GUARDING

Less flexible, limited to the specific location they are guarding.

05

Lower deterrent effect due to being stationary.

06

Provides focused coverage of a specific area or location.

07

Generally less expensive due to lower personnel and equipment costs.

08

Suitable for static locations like offices, warehouses or factories.
